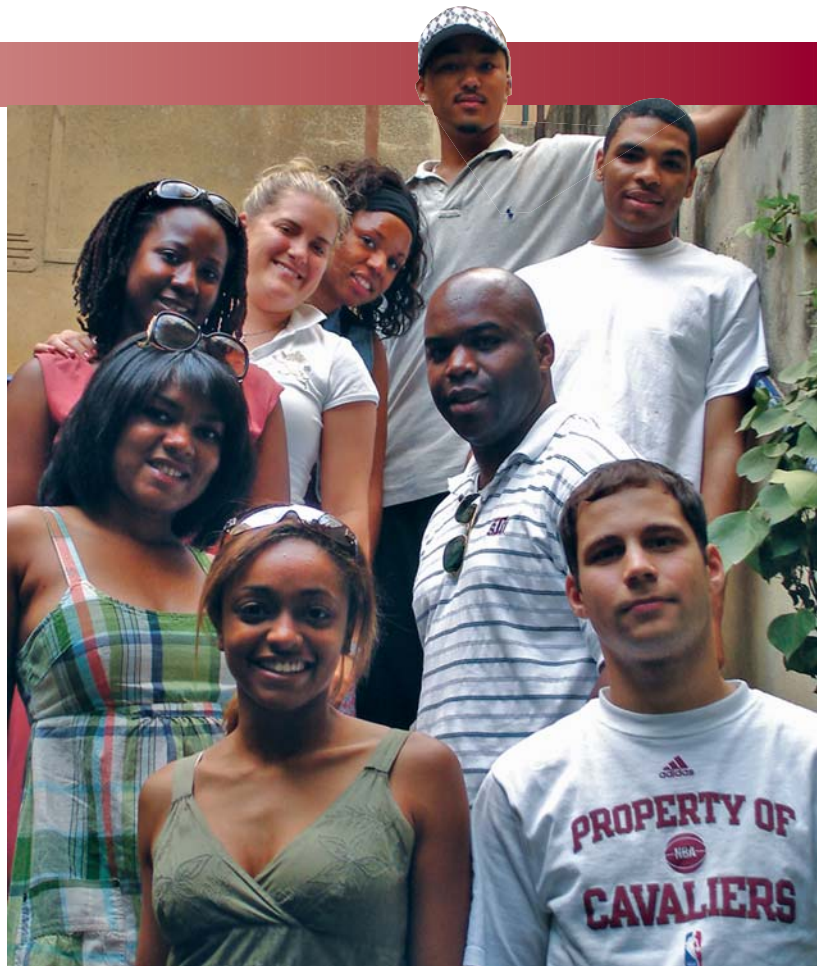

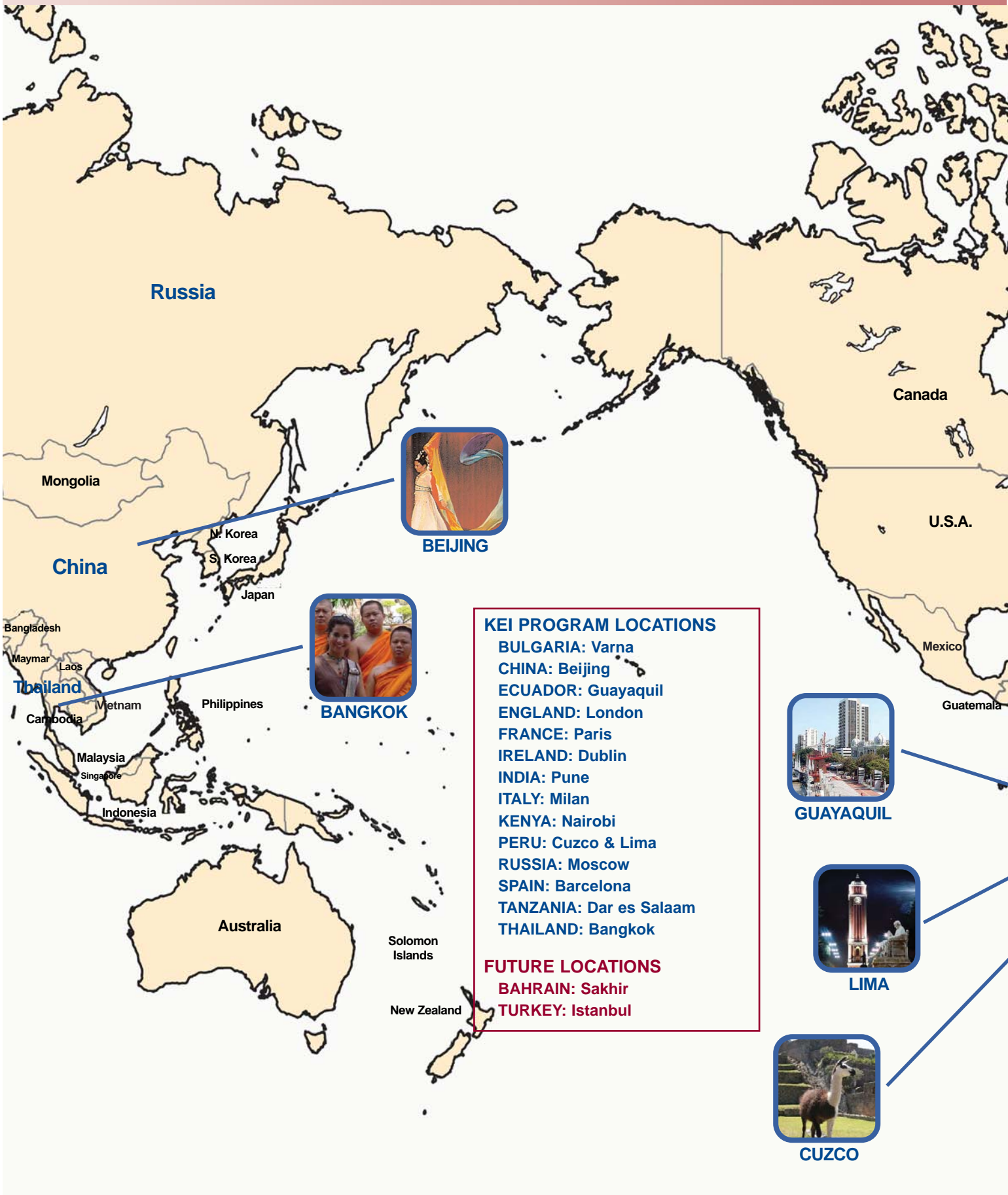

ACADEMIC STANDARDS

KEI carefully selects host institutions based on their reputation, faculty expertise and ability to provide a unique and challenging academic environment. KEI students learn from qualified professors alongside local students. The methods of instruction and assessment remain consistent with the educational system of the host country.

PROGRAMS IN ENGLISH

Courses are taught in the English language by professors from the host institution. KEI students are integrated with local students during the academic year to enhance the academic and social interaction. There is no foreign language requirement to participate in a KEI program, but students are encouraged to take a foreign language course during the program. Many locations also offer courses taught in the language of the host country.

INTERNSHIPS, RESEARCH & SERVICE

KEI programs offer internships, research and community service opportunities that allow students to gain practical experience abroad. Sixty-five percent of KEI students choose to participate in some type of experiential learning during their semester and summer program. Refer to individual programs for more information.

EVALUATION VISITS

KEI staff visit each location on a regular basis to evaluate the operation, management and quality of the program. KEI also organizes program familiarization visits for study abroad administrators and academic faculty. Participants tour the host campus and housing, observe classes, meet with faculty and staff, speak with KEI and local students and experience the host culture. ACADEMIC CREDIT

KEI programs award credit for coursework and academic work done in conjunction with internships. One official and one unofficial transcript is included with the program. Transcripts are issued by the host institution, KEI's University of Record and/or a Co-Sponsor Institution.

Universities and colleges have different requirements and procedures for transferring program credit. Students should consult with the study abroad and/or academic advisors at their university or college. Call KEI for assistance. We will guide you through the credit approval process.

UNIVERSITY OF RECORD

A University of Record (UOR) is an accredited university in the USA that oversees study abroad programs and awards program credit. Clark Atlanta University (CAU) is the UOR for all KEI programs except Kenya. CAU is a member institution of the Atlanta University Center, the largest consortium of African American, private higher education institutions in the country. CAU is accredited by the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools.

KEI's program in Kenya is hosted by the United States International University, accredited in the USA by the Western Association of Schools and Colleges.

CO-SPONSOR INSTITUTION

A Co-Sponsor Institution (CSI) is a university or college, accredited in the USA, that has partnered with KEI on a semester, academic year and/or summer study abroad program. In general, co-sponsored programs are managed by KEI. The CSI provides academic and logistical oversight for the program, assists with the application and enrollment process, and issues program transcripts.

The University at Albany, State University of New York (SUNY Albany), is a co-sponsor for programs offered in Moscow, Russia and Pune, India. SUNY Albany is an internationally recognized public research institution. SUNY Albany is accredited by the Middle States Commission on Higher Education.

PROGRAM FEE

KEI offers two program fee options. Do not hesitate to call our office if you are not sure which option is best for your situation.

Comprehensive Fee: This fee includes everything listed in the left column. Students must budget additional funds for airfare, visa fees, meals and personal expenses. Comprehensive fees are listed in this catalogue on individual program pages.

Comprehensive Plus: This fee also includes airfare, visa allowance and a meal allowance. Students must budget additional funds for personal expenses. The Comprehensive Plus fee depends on your departure city, home university and personal preferences. Contact KEI for a quote.

The budget for financial aid recipients and an estimate of personal expenses for each program are available on the KEI website.

FINANCIAL AID

KEI Scholarships range from \$500 to \$2000. Scholarships are awarded based on merit and need. **KEI Payment Plans** allow qualified students to defer up to \$2000, interest free. KEI scholarships and payment plans require a separate application. Call our office for detailed information.

Federal Financial Aid can be used to study abroad. Federal aid includes Pell Grants, SEOG, PLUS loans, Perkins loans and Stafford loans. Many colleges also allow the use of state grants and institutional scholarships. KEI will accept any financial aid your home school will release.

Private Student Loans are available through third-party lending institutions. A list of providers is available on the KEI website.

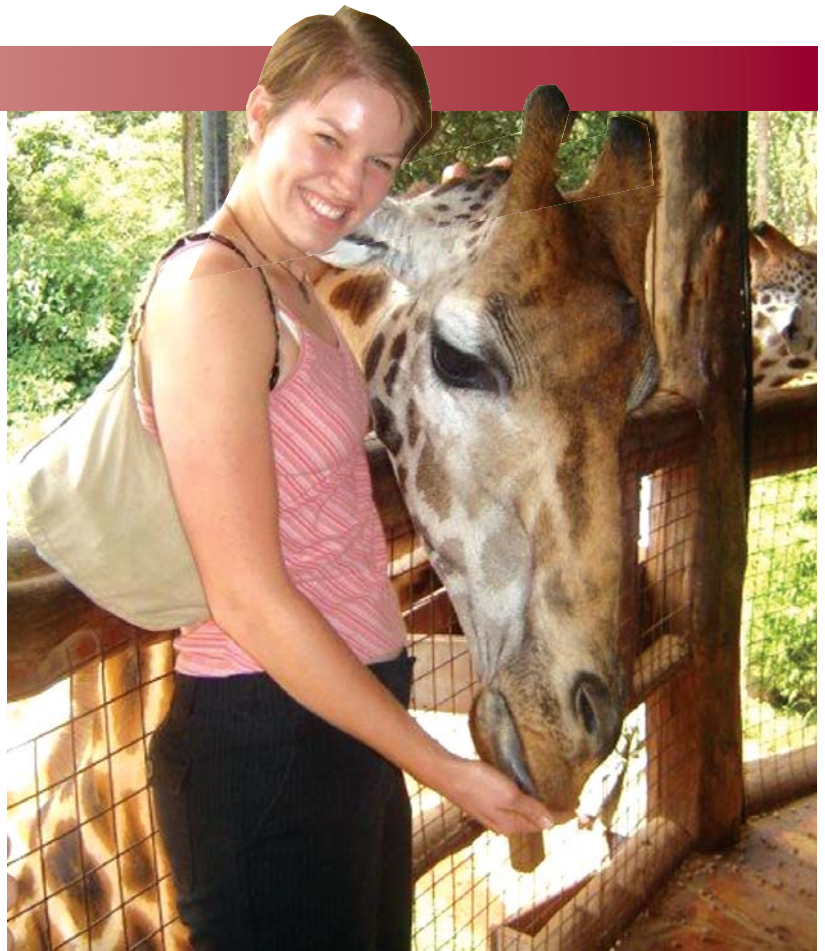

COMPREHENSIVE INSURANCE

KEI programs in Bulgaria, China, Ecuador, France (semester and summer), Ireland, Peru, Russia, Spain, Tanzania and Thailand include Atlas Travel Insurance, which covers medical services, emergency dental, trip interruption, lost luggage, evacuation and reunion and many other services. Coverage is for \$50,000 with a \$250 deductible. The policy is administered by HCC Medical Insurance Services and underwritten by Lloyd's of London.

KEI programs in France (academic year), India and Kenya include the national health insurance of the host country, which is required for all students. The International Student Identification Card (ISIC) is also included. ISIC provides basic travel insurance and discounts for select products and activities.

MOBILE PHONE

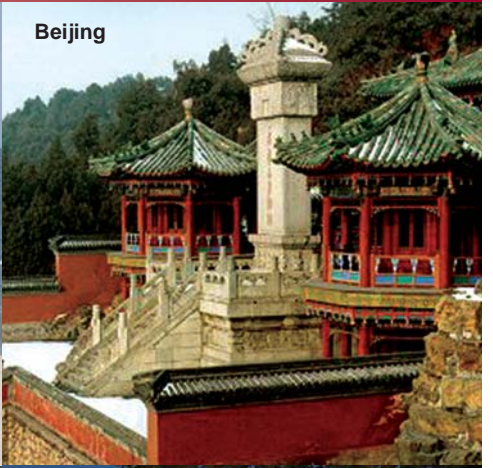

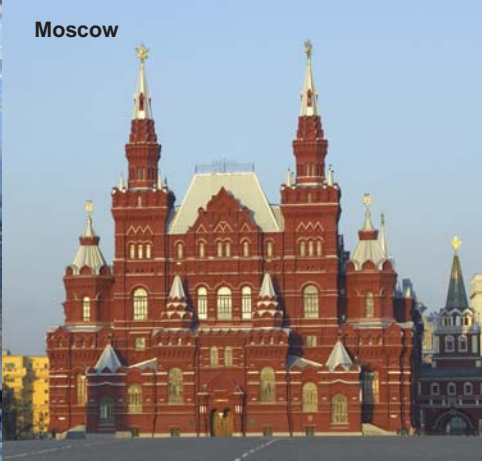

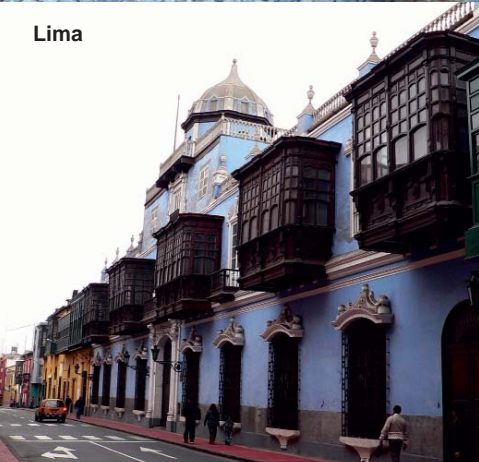

Varna, the Black Sea capital of Bulgaria, combines ancient, medieval, renaissance and modern history and culture in a cosmopolitan setting. Apart from being a beach resort, Varna offers numerous cultural attractions, historical buildings, museums and art galleries. The city also provides access to some of the most beautiful scenic spots along the Black Sea coast, including the nature reserve of Kamchiya, the royal palace of Balchik and the hillside monastery of Aladzha.

The University of Economics (UEV), founded in 1920, is recognized as one of the leading institutions of higher learning in Bulgaria. The university offers undergraduate and graduate programs in economics, finance, management, informatics, tourism, political economy, legal studies and foreign languages. UEV faculty are amongst the top academics in the country.

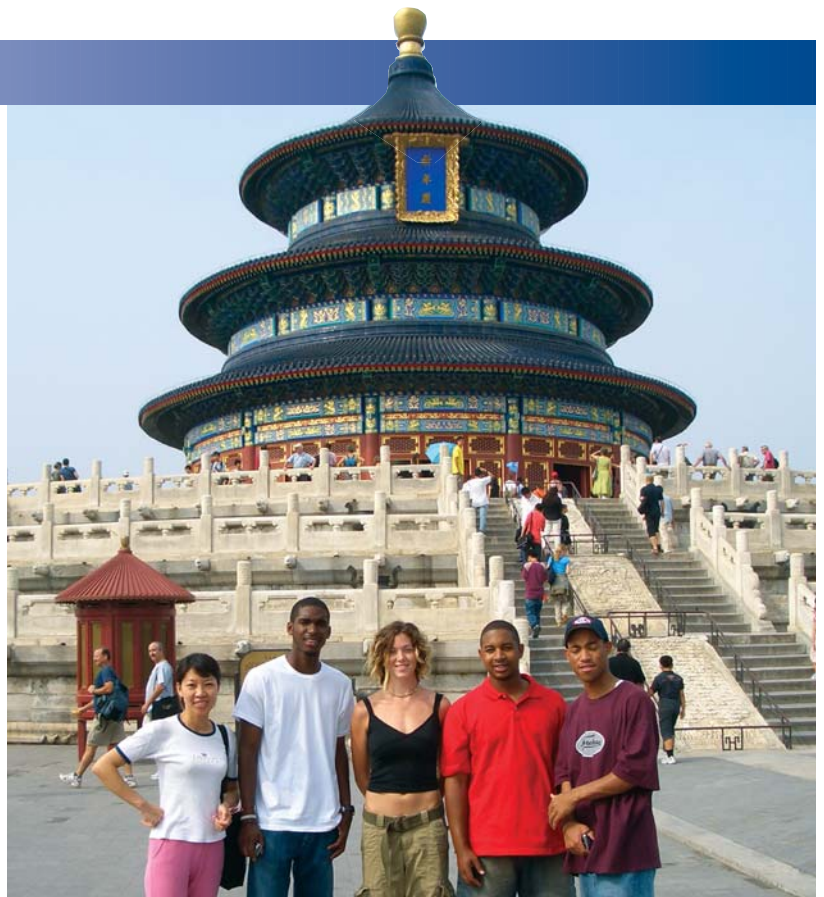

China's traditions, music and architecture are the result of 3,000 years of history. China is the world's most populous nation, with 1.3 billion inhabitants.

Beijing is the political, economic and cultural capital. It is the intellectual hub of the nation, with more universities than any other city in China. The Forbidden City and Temple of Heaven are reminders of Beijing's past, while the modern transportation and skyscrapers are signs of its optimistic future.

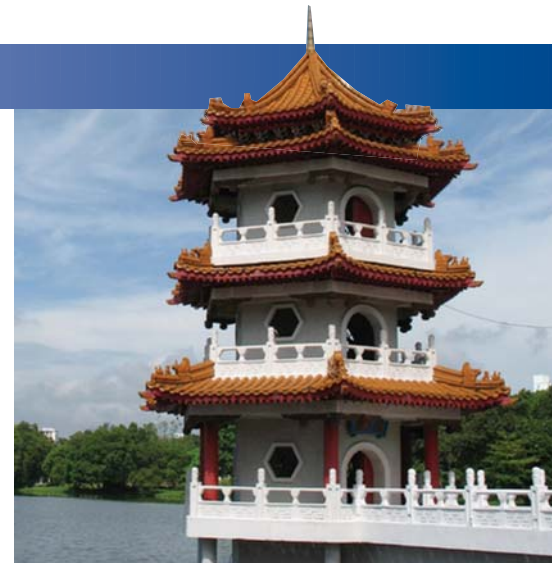

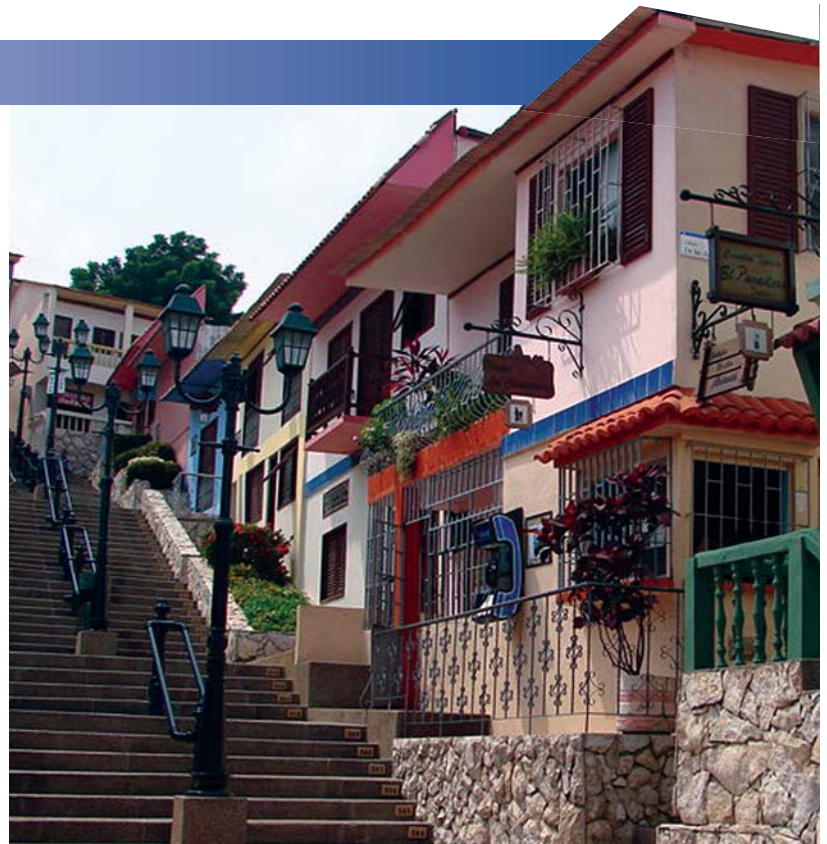

HOST LOCATION

The Republic of Ecuador is characterized by geographic, natural and cultural diversity. Bordered by Colombia, Peru and the Pacific Ocean, the country spans the Northern and Southern hemispheres with the equator running through the center. Ecuador is home to 1,600 species of birds, 25,000 species of plants, 106 species of reptiles, 138 amphibians and 6,000 species of butterfly. The Galapagos Islands are well known as a region of distinct fauna, famous as the place of birth of Darwin's Theory of Evolution.

Guayaquil, founded in 1538 by Spanish conquistador Francisco de Orellana, traces its origin to the Incas Empire. Today, Guayaquil serves as the financial, commercial and cultural center of Ecuador. Guayaquil is uniquely positioned at the crossroads of mangrove swamp, tropical dry forest, desert and marine ecosystems. With easy access to tropical beaches, the Amazon basin and other ecological destinations, Guayaquil is becoming one of the tourist destinations in Latin America.

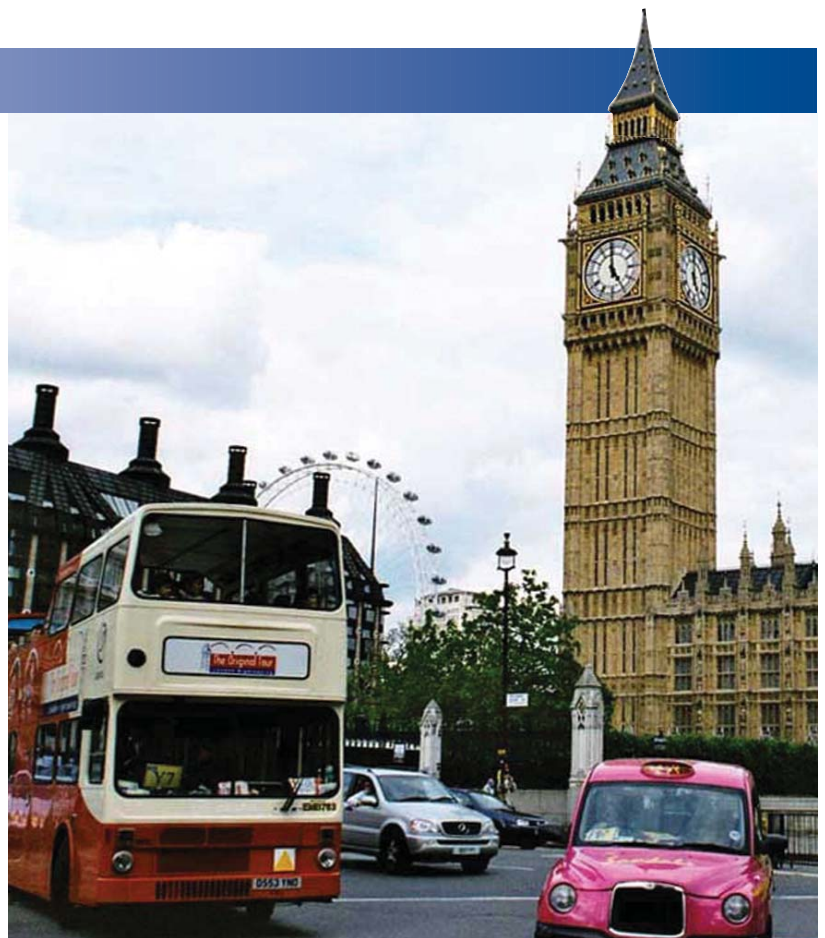

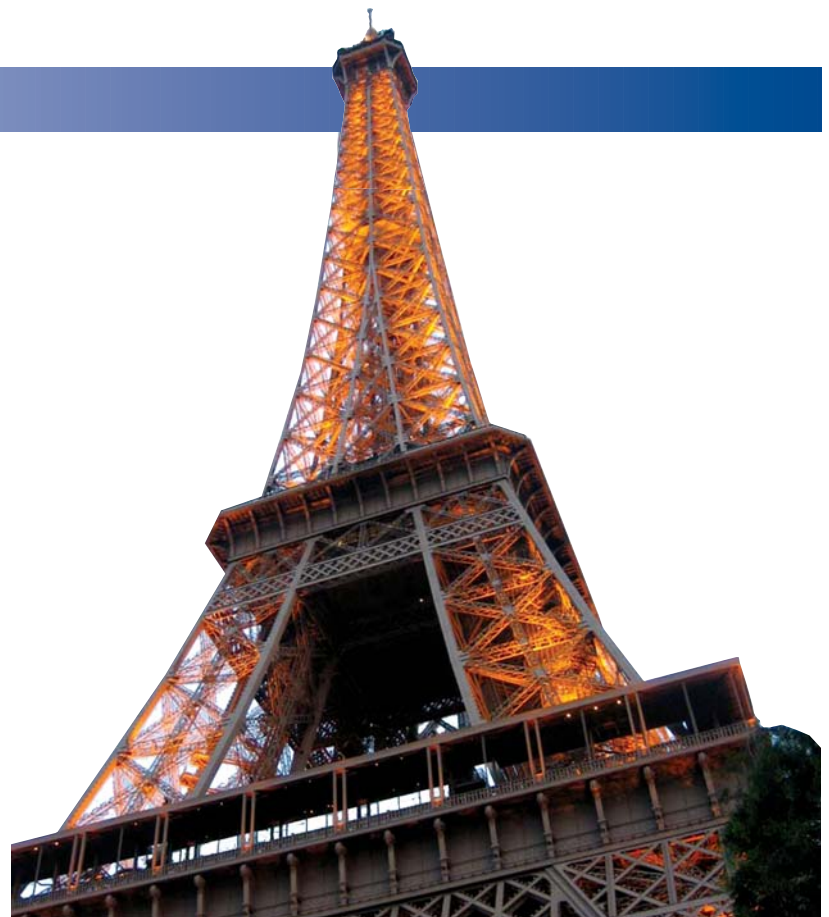

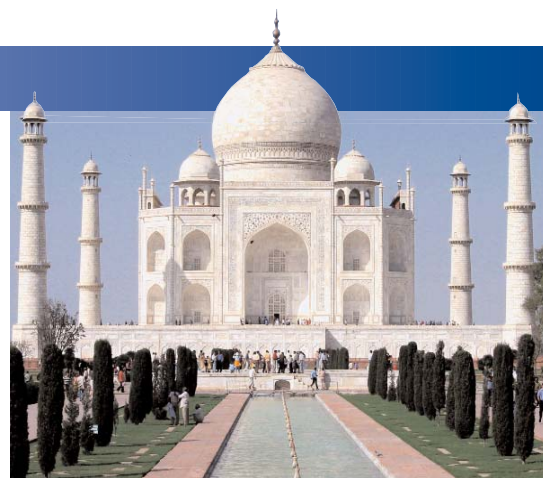

HOST LOCATION

Peru is characterized by natural and cultural diversity, resulting in a wide diversity of expression in art, cuisine, literature and music. The main spoken language is Spanish, although a significant number of Peruvians speak Quechua and other native languages.

Lima is the capital and economic center of Peru. The city is a melting pot of European, Andean and Asian cultures. The Historic Center is a UNESCO World Heritage Site with architecture dating back to the Inca and colonial eras. The city offers a wide array of museums, parks, theaters and restaurants.

Cuzco, the capital city of the Inca Empire, colonial administrative center and a UNESCO World Heritage site, has a deep sense of history, tradition and culture. Perched in the Andean mountains, Cuzco is the most visited city in Latin America due to its proximity to Machu Picchu and other Inca and Quechua sites.

HOST INSTITUTION

Universidad San Ignacio de Loyola (USIL), founded in 1993, is an autonomous not for profit institution of higher learning. The university offers a comprehensive curriculum that is taught in Spanish and English.

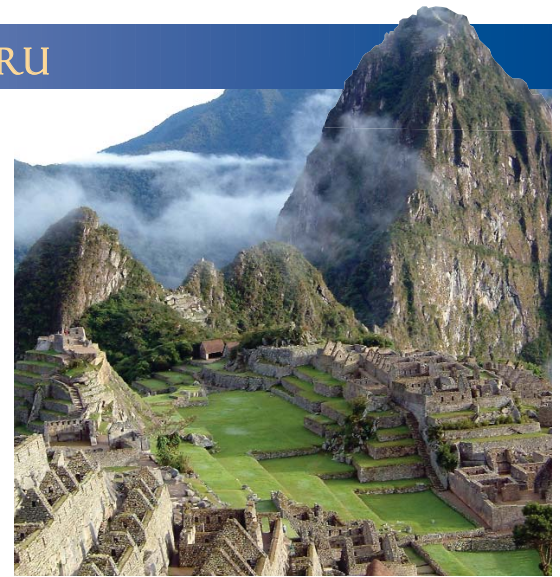

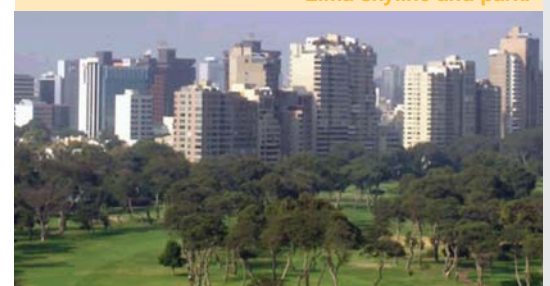

The curriculum offers a wide range of major-specific courses as well as Spanish language and liberal arts. KEI participants are integrated in classes with Peruvian students. Students also have a broad range of internship and community service options.

Cuzco is ideal for students who want to live in a small city with deep-rooted traditions and history. Cuzco's architecture, art and culture are shaped by its historical role as the capital of the Inca empire and Spanish colonialism. The curriculum focuses on intensive Spanish language, Andean culture and Peruvian studies.

Still not sure? Study in both locations during consecutive terms. For example, Fall semester in Lima and Spring semester in Cuzco; or Spring in Cuzco and Summer in Lima; or Summer Session I in Lima and Summer Session II in Cuzco. Dar es Salaam has a unique blend of history and modernity.

HOST LOCATION

Dar es Salaam was founded in 1862 by the Sultan of Zanzibar, who gave its name: "Haven of Peace." Today, the city is an eclectic mix of Swahili, German, Asian and British architecture, reflecting its colonial past and recent history.

Dar es Salaam serves as the economic and cultural center of Tanzania. Life in the city revolves around the large harbor with a surrounding business district.

Tanzania is a mixture of more than 120 ethnic groups. The majority of people speak Bantu languages, including Kiswahili, the official language. Major religions include Christianity, Islam, Hinduism and tribal traditions.

Tanzania has much to offer — amazing wildlife parks, unique marine ecosystems, spice islands, tropical beaches, the highest mountain in Africa and a rich cultural heritage. The country's relative isolation from the West also provides a unique view of a society in transition.

HOST INSTITUTION

The University of Dar es Salaam (UDSM) is the major institution of higher learning in Tanzania. UDSM consists of six faculties, five institutes and the Muhimbili University College of Health Sciences. Since its establishment, the university has been internationally recognized for its curricular and research accomplishments.

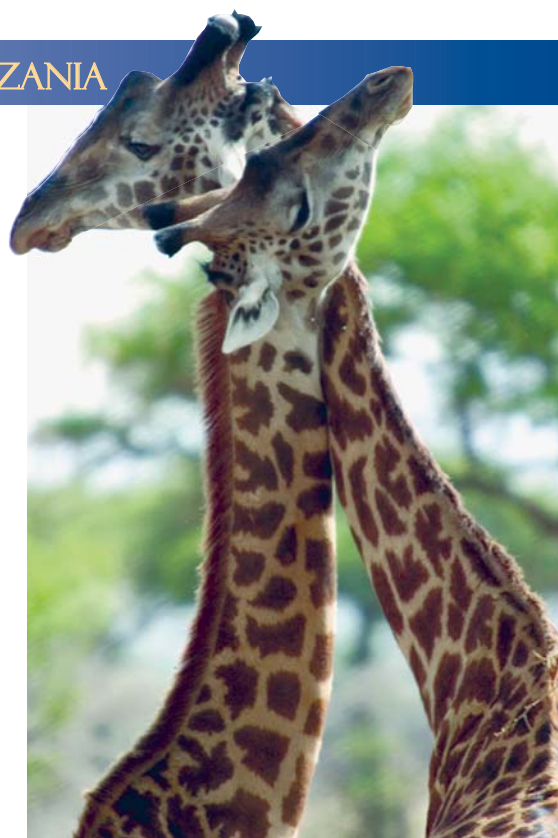

Quarter & Academic Year

The curriculum offers a wide selection of courses (taught in English), optional internships and community service. KEI students are integrated with Thai and international students in all classes. The typical course-load is 16 credits per quarter. Most courses are 4 credits. Internships are 3 to 8 credits, depending on time commitment.

Summer Session I (with Optional Internship)

Students enroll in 2 course (8 quarter/6 semester credits). An optional internship (4 quarter/3 semester credits) is available as an add-on. The *Thai Society & Culture* course is recommended. Courses are taught by faculty from Mahidol University and visiting faculty from universities in the USA. Credit is awarded by the professor's home university.

Summer Session II

Students enroll in 2 courses (8 quarter/6 semester credits). A limited number of courses is offered from various disciplines, including Thai studies, ecology, mathematics, business, communications, etc. Session II can be combined with Session I or the Summer Internship Program.

Summer Internship

Internships (8 quarter/6 semester credits) are available in a wide range of professional, research, clinical and humanitarian fields. Courses are not offered with this option. See INTERNSHIP section for details.

Bioethics CrossCultural Education Program (BioCEP)

Students explore how culture and religion influence medical ethics in emerging infections, malnutrition, medical tourism, stem cell research, Western and Eastern medicine, organ transplants, public health, genetic testing, abortion and reproductive medicine. This 6-credit program is organized in cooperation with the Center for Bioethics at the College of Physicians and Surgeons, Columbia University.

INTEGRATED PROGRAMS

Integrated programs allow a professor and a small group of students from the same university (or a consortium of universities) to “integrate” into an existing summer or semester program offered by KEI. The professor’s course (or project) becomes part of the KEI program curriculum and open to all students participating on the KEI program.

Students can enroll in courses and projects offered by faculty from KEI’s host university abroad as well as visiting faculty from the USA. Most locations offer a wide selection of courses from diverse academic disciplines, allowing various Majors to participate in the program.

The professor’s main responsibility is to teach his/her course, allowing time for professional and personal interests. International travel, housing, group activities and a teaching stipend are covered by KEI. Since the program fee is predetermined (see program pages) and spread across the KEI program, only 6 students must come with the professor.

CUSTOMIZED PROGRAMS

Customized programs are designed to meet specific needs of professors and students from the same university (or a consortium of universities). The academic focus, program dates and travel itinerary are decided entirely by the professor. Programs can span a week, month, semester or anything in between; offered during the summer, winter break or spring break, or as a semester add-on; organized in more than 50 countries where KEI has a support network; and include guest speakers and/or team-teaching with local faculty.

The professor is responsible for leading his/her course (or project) and coordinating pre-departure preparations and student services. International travel, housing and group activities for the professor are covered by KEI. The program fee is based on requirements, locations and duration. It is recommended that groups include 12 or more students to take advantage of cost savings.

SCIENCE & MEDICINE ABROAD

KEI offers a *summer* enrichment program in Salaya, Thailand for motivated secondary students interested in science, medicine, mathematics, computer technology and engineering. The curriculum offers cutting-edge research and clinical internships at Mahidol University, one of the leading scientific and medical institutions in Southeast Asia. Students earn 6 college credits. A GPA of 3.5 or higher is required for admission.

Research selection is based on interest and availability of projects. Students are expected to write a journal-style research paper under supervision of their scientist mentors for submission to various science contests. Below is a general list of research directions available at Mahidol University. Visit the KEI website for detailed information.

Clinical internships are intended for students interested in practicing medicine rather than conducting research. Students rotate through different departments at the University Hospital or focus on one department, such as cardiovascular, pediatrics, neurology, etc. Internship activities may include clinical rounds with physicians, assisting hospital staff with patient management and limited care, and observing different diagnostics, treatments and surgeries.

This program was established in 1992 by the Stuyvesant Center and managed by KEI since 1997. Originally based at the Pushchino Science Center in Russia (until 2007), the program was moved to Mahidol University for logistical, cost and safety reasons. **Since its establishment, more than 30 program alumni had their work published in research journals, 30% advanced to semifinals of the Intel Science Talent Search and similar contests, and 8% advanced to finals.**
