Short Description	This module examines penal theory and practice in a theoretical, comparative
(max. 100 words)	and historical way, and engages critically with the theoretical justifications and policy proposals for punishment. The module presents the juridical perspectives and rationales of punishment, historical and sociological explanations of punishment. The course also reflects on the race, class and gender bias in the penal system and critically discusses the concept of 'crisis' of the penal system as well as the issue of the privatisation of punishment.
Aims	The aim of this module is to introduce the main ideas, concepts and perspectives that are found in modern Western penology and to develop an understanding of different theories of punishment to develop a familiarity with the different penal policies and practices to encourage students to think critically about the multiple purposes informing punishment to foster a critical discussion about the effectiveness of contemporary forms of punishment
