Teaching and Learning Methods

Teaching in the early stages of the course will be based on formal lectures, which are aimed at providing the students with a firm grasp of the basic principles of the subject. Subsequent lectures will be participative and will incorporate question and answer sessions. Tutorials form a more intimate forum and are intended to encourage the students to voice their opinions and improve their research, I.T., critical integrative and cognitive skills. An important aim of the tutorials will be to ensure that the student has studied and researched case law, legislation and articles rather than merely relying on lecture notes and textbooks.

Integration and Linkage

Intellectual Property law shares many common elements with subjects such as the Law of Contract I & II, Equity & Trusts Law I & II and the Law of Torts I & II. The linkages to Equity & Trust law I & II include the use of the injunction, and, in particular, the use of the interlocutory injunction to prevent trade mark abuse and patent violation. The linkages to the Law of Contract I & II comprise the vital importance of the formation of a valid and binding contract in the context of the assignment of intellectual property rights. This programme as proposed will improve student's research, conceptual and critical skills.

Learning Outcomes

On successful completion of the module students should be able to:

- Critically analyse patent law in Ireland and compare such law to other jurisdictions
- Assess the impact of copyright law
- Evaluate the effectiveness of Trade Mark legislation

- Compare and contrast the different forms of protection offered to intellectual property rights under Irish law.

Assessment

30% of the module marks will be allocated to course work with the remaining 70% of the marks being reserved for an end of semester examination. The coursework will involve a significant piece of written work where the student's critical faculties and ability to conduct independent research will be assessed.
