

Course: Irish Language and Heritage

Course Code: FLA 100

Credits: 3 credits

Description:

The Irish language (Gaeilge) is one of the oldest languages in Europe and can trace its roots back to the 4th century AD. Today, about one-seventh of the population of the Republic of Ireland speaks Irish, which amounts to about 500,000 people. This course, which is at beginner's level, will enable the student to gain a basic competence in the language, and will also provide for the study of aspects of Irish heritage including, built environment and natural environment, literature, ecology, food, dance, music and rural traditions.

Aims of Course

- To acquire a basic competency in the Irish language
- To gain a basic understanding of how the language works
- To deepen the awareness of Irish language and heritage among students
- To experience the richness of the Irish natural environment and the human environment through visits and fieldtrips

Learning Goals

- Make common greetings in Irish
- Recall and articulate basic Irish words and phrases accurately
- Express common needs in Irish
- Develop an interest in Irish heritage, language and literature
- Discover some of the antiquities of the Irish landscape

Course Objectives

This course will be aimed at beginners using a communicative approach to language teaching with interaction between learners and tutors in the Irish language. The main approach will be on interactive games and exercises to enable the learner to gain competence and confidence in using simple phrases, common greetings and everyday language structures.

By the end of the course participants will have learnt how to engage in simple everyday interactions and will have acquired a basic knowledge of grammar. The heritage part of the course will be taught through the medium of English and will complement the learning of the Irish language. By the end of the course the student will have interacted with a number of guest lecturers who will introduce them to different aspects of Irish heritage and culture.

Procedures

Lectures: 6 hours per week.

Classes (2 in the morning) will be of 85 minutes duration either side of a ten-minute break. Students will be assigned readings, online tasks and video presentations. The courses aim to develop skills and knowledge through flexible delivery which will include active learning, collaborative group work, facilitated group discussion and structured activities. Tutors will endeavor to promote learner autonomy to enable students to achieve maximum potential from their courses. Questioning, debate and

discussion and interactive activities such as drama and role play will be integral to the delivery of lectures

Day 4: Irish traditional Irish Music & Dance—in history & practice (Máirtín Tourish)

This 1-day module charts the evolution of Irish traditional music from the time of the great collectors of the eighteenth century to the birth of the dance show and the worldwide phenomenon it is today. Key points include cultural nationalism in music, the harping tradition, the golden period of Irish-American recordings, regional styles, *Comhaltas Ceoltóirí Éireann*, the tune-types, Seán Ó Riada and the birth of the ensemble. Students will have the opportunity to learn to play a tune on the tin-whistle and learn a dance from the sean-nós tradition.

General Aims of the Module:

- **To introduce students** to the key points in the evolution of Irish traditional music.
- **To provide students with a discerning ear** for the various sub-genres, styles and ornaments used.
- **To give each of the students** an opportunity to experience learning Irish traditional music through the oral approach to cultural transmission.

Learning Goals:

- To have an knowledge of the key themes in the development of Irish traditional music.
- An understanding of the Irish-American recordings of the 1920s and 1940s and their impact on stylistic homogenisation in Ireland.
- To be able to identify the salient characteristics of the various regional styles and to distinguish the more popular tune type forms of instrumental music.

To be able to play a tune on the tin-whistle from George Petrie's *Ancient Music of Ireland* (1855) and perform a basic sean-nós step.
