Course title	Aesthetics

Course Description	The course will present the evolution of the most relevant subjects of Aesthetics, with special attention given to the ideas of Beauty and Art. The development of these subjects will start with the first attempts of aesthetics (Classical Greece) and will arrive to the present, when the interaction among Aesthetics, Design and Fashion has now become a necessary territory where these three disciplines converge.
Learning Objectives and Outcomes	At the end of the course the student will be able to recognize and analyze different theories on "Beauty." Learning outcomes and skills learned include: 1. Identification and recognition of the specific artistic/philosophical language of Western civilization's concept of "Bello e Bellezza" (Ancient, Medieval, Renaissance, Baroque, Neoclassical, Romantic, etc.). 2. Understanding of the history of Aesthetics as an ancient and modern discipline; the concept of Beauty as subjective and objective, the semiotics of objects in art. 3. Applying acquired knowledge to the class project, demonstrating the ability to identify in "Beauty" not merely exterior characteristics (= the ability to "communicate" and contribute to cultural and personal enrichment). 4. Research and creation of a project on Aesthetics, including its presentation in oral and written form.

Week 12	The new beauty of the "Object": the Industrial Revolution and the Great Exhibition in London (1851). The machine is "beautiful?" The relationship between man and machine.
Week 13	The birth of Design and the concept of "widespread beauty." Politeism of Beauty: contemporary inputs for the definition of Beauty.
Week 14	Latest trends in Aesthetics: the Neuroaesthetics – contemporary studies by Semir Zeki and Vilayanur Ramachandran.
