Semester	Spring semester: January - May 2022
Course Description	The course gives the students an overview of Italian Cinema, its genres, movements, from the silent era to the present. The focus is primarily about Italian cinema as an art form, with the director paying a key role. Students will be introduced to the world and ideas of famous film directors such as Rossellini, De Sica, Visconti, Fellini, Antonioni, Leone, Bertolucci. Films will be deeply analysed and compared in their own stylistic, technical and conceptual aspects. Particular attention will be given to Neorealism, a cinematic era that had a world- wide influence and still persists in today's movies. Films made in Italy have always been characterised by a close link to Italian literature and current social problems. Historical periods such as Fascism, the economic boom, political protests and their impact on Italian society and culture will be taken into consideration. Italian film genres, such as <i>comedy Italian style</i> , <i>spaghetti western</i> , <i>peplum</i> , <i>poliziesco</i> will be also introduced and analyzed. Special emphasis will be also given to contemporary films in order to understand current issues of Italian society and culture.
Learning Objectives and Outcomes	 At the end of the course, students will be able to: Demonstrate their understanding of a historical overview of Italian Cinema, its themes and genres, cultural and social background. Recognize the typical characteristics of Italian Cinema, with an understanding of the important social and artistic role cinema has played in Italian society. Identify different styles, ideas and techniques of Italian Cinema. View films in an active, critical way, with an understanding of the director's ideas and style.
