





Spanish Language Beginner 1 (A1)

Level: Beginner I (A1)*

ACTFL Levels: Intermediate Low (reading and listening); Novice High (speaking and writing)

Institution: EDE Escuela de Español

Academic Credit: 6 ECTS; 3 US semester credits; 45 contact hours

OVERVIEW

This course pays special attention to graduation and sequence of content, combining linguistic (lexical and grammatical) and pragmatic skills in each unit. The student will be an active element of the teaching and learning process where he/she feels empowered to complete course requirements.

LEARNING OUTCOMES

Students, upon completion of the program, should reach the following learning outcomes:

- 1. Be able to understand, and use frequently, everyday expressions and basic phrases aimed at satisfying immediate needs.
- 2. Introducing themselves and other people.
- 3. Asking and giving basic personal information about their home, belongings and people they know interacting in a simple way, provided the other speaker talks slowly and clearly.

Grammatical competence

- Regular and irregular verbs in Present indicative.
- Use and form of the most frequently used phrasal verbs in Spanish such as: TENER QUE + infinitive and IR A + infinitive
- Verbs GUSTAR and DOLER.

Pragmatic competence

- Ask and give information about oneself and/or others.
- Ask and give information about a location.
- Describe people, places and things.
- Express tastes and preferences.
- Propose activities, accept and reject them.
- Give instructions, express obligation and prohibition.
- Shopping.
- Express physical condition and mood.

METHODOLOGY

The aim of the classes is both linguistic and cultural learning. Structured grammar, exercises, games, reading texts, role play, and study teamwork are the main components of our classes. The course is taught in Spanish using the immersion method.

Learning in the Classroom

Material: Required Textbook

Student book, workbook and CD.

In addition, the educational center will provide:

- Supplementary materials in class: activities, games, readings, etc.
- Use of the audiovisual material from the center to work with interactive resources, film, music, presentations, etc.

Immersion and practice

Students join a tutorial focused one or more of the following:

• Spanish Grammar Review (Tutorial)

Students who need additional support will be required to attend grammar tutorial.

1 hour per week. These activities are intended to facilitate linguistic immersion and provide instruction focusing on the students' interests.

EVALUATION

Student progression in the different language skills (reading comprehension, listening comprehension, writing, oral expression, interaction and mediation) is measured by:

- Tests and exams 70%, (50% Written, 20% Oral)
- Performing Tasks 20%
- Class participation 10%

In addition, students who complete the number of hours and sufficiently pass academic content and objectives for the A1 level, have the opportunity to take an assessment test which certifies that eligible to reach the next level (A2). The Cervantes Official Exam is proctored by Universidad de Burgos and costs between 90 and 180 euro. If a student is interested in participating in this exam, please inform your instructor who will provide the relevant information.
