- 1. To identify similarities and differences between first and second language acquisition
- 2. To provide students with a basic understanding of current theories in SLA, including interlanguage theory, the monitor model, pragmatics, cognitive and learning styles, linguistic universals, as well as factors affecting L2 learning
- 3. To relate theoretical models of SLA to ESOL approaches, methodologies, and techniques
- 4. To identify the different types of communication strategies and assess their use in the ESOL classroom
- 5. To apply the knowledge of SLA theory to practice and to be able to develop assessment tools appropriate for L2 learners
- 6. To provide an understanding of cognitive styles and learning strategies and their implication for learning and teaching in the classroom

- 7. To enable students to critically review research and its implications for effective ESOL teaching
- 8. To examine and evaluate Thailand's national standards for English and its implications for Thai students.
